
Mega-events


- Great opportunity, enormous costs:
 - Improve (build?) infrastructure; upgrades may or may not be sustainable (Montreal 1976, Athens 2004)
 - Costs paid with public funds; nothing better to spend them on?
 - Schools? Hospitals? **Public** sports facilities?
 - Sochi: \$50b to host Winter Ol (SA 2010? Other?)

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
Legacies


- Mega-events are usually touted as opportunities for progress and investment
- Rio 2016 outturn cost (operational costs + direct capital costs but <u>not</u> indirect costs): \$4.6b (Oxford Olympics Study 2016)
 - London 2012: \$15b; Beijing 2008: \$6.8b






















Facilities that were built poorly and in a hurry will need to be substantially remodeled before they can be sold to residents.





Gentrification and forced evictions

- G.: A community where the value of the land has increased but the wealth of the residents has not; dwellers are priced out
- Forced eviction of residents:
 - 1988: 720,000 (<u>source</u>)
 - 1996: 30,000 (source)
 - 2000: Rents rose 40% (source)
 - 2008: 300,000 until 2004 (<u>source</u>), perhaps 1.5m (<u>source</u>)
 - 2012: 450 (<u>source</u>)2016: 77,000 (<u>source</u>)

FIFA bribery scandals

- Two investigations into corruption at FIFA:
- 1. <u>Bribes and kickbacks, 1990-2014 (multiple generations)</u>
 - More than \$150m (over 1 billion RMB) to stage tournaments including Copa América, Copa Libertadores
 - 2010 FIFA World Cup, 2011 FIFA presidential elections?
 - Awarding of TV rights
 - US investigation (corruption planned in U.S., exec. through US bank accounts); trial in New York

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FIFA scandals

- Outcomes of New York FIFA trial:
- 23 guilty pleas
- Guilty of racketeering, wire fraud*:
 - Juan Ángel Napout, fmr. President, Conmebol (South American football's governing body)
 - José Maria Marin (pictured), former President,
 Brazil's football federation; 2014 WC LOC

FIFA scandals

2. Awarding of 2018, 2022 WC to Russia, Qatar

- Fmr US Attorney Michael Garcia hired, prepares
 430 pg report. Only 42 pg summary published,
 "breaches of very limited scope." Garcia:
 - "Incomplete and erroneous"
- Swiss investigation
- Misconduct, money laundering



FIFA scandals

- FIFA in Switzerland:
 - Charitable organization: "Unifying, educational, cultural, and humanitarian values...youth and development programmes."
 - Earns more than \$1b/year (4y cycles) from WC (about 87% of total revenue)
 - No taxes in Switzerland on World Cup revenues
 - Demands tax exemptions (FIFA, suppliers, ath...)
 - \$17 million tax expenses

Why this matters?

- FIFA runs global football
- The World Cup is one of the biggest sporting events in the world and generates billions of dollars in revenue
 - Questionable transparency and honesty for the process of allocating the last three tournaments
- Who profits? At whose expense? What happens to costs? (Why?)

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Why this matters?

- Media rights fees (sale, resale, profits, total cost): 3.2b audience, 1b WC Final
- Organizing expenses (fixed + bribes; at whose expense?)
 - Brazil: \$4 billion cost
 - FIFA: \$2 billion profit
- Competitors' expenses
 - FA: \$30 million failed bid attempt
- Sponsors' expenses...Consumers' expenses

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Athlete safety

- Strong concerns over brain trauma (esp. CTE) deriving from repeated hits to the head
 - American football, boxing: <u>GQ</u>, NY Times doc.
 - US parents sued FIFA, US Soccer for not doing enough to prevent
- Professional level (top athletes, coaches, trainers, doctors):
 youth sports with inexperienced coaches?



Sexual abuse

- USA Gymnastics: 368+ gymn. sexually assaulted by gym owners, coaches, staff over 20+ years
- Larry Nasser (doctor for USAG, Mich. State U.):
 265+ women over 14+ years
 - Indianapolis Star reports about USAG routinely dismissing sexual abuse allegations
- Recently: Richard Strauss allegedly abused 177+ athletes as a doctor at Ohio State University

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Differences in Sexual Development (DSD)

- Caster Semenya's chromosomes
- CAS: Rules discriminate against her, but policy "necessary, reasonable and proportionate" to ensure fair competition in women's sport
- High testosterone level...But athletic success depends on more
- Phelps, Bolt *also* have genetic adv.!
- Hormone-suppressors...Why? (Did not cheat.) Risks, side effects?
 - Or just quit?



Why ALL this matters?

- Most of these events are timely and are not isolated
- Inform, educate, entertain to protect the public interest. Power can corrupt; journalists act on behalf of public, voters, taxpayers, stakeholders
- Also inform, educate, entertain to protect sport: Nothing against [FIFA, Olympics, professional sport], only against crooks in it.
 Want to make sports better.
